Starting a Team - Recruitment

VASO suggests starting with one team for your first year.

- 15 students are easier to manage and organize while you learn than 30 or 45!
- 15 is the *max* per team. You can field a smaller team.
- If the student interest is there, you can field more, but don't be afraid to set boundaries for yourself in this if 2 or 3 teams feels like too much.



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Starting a Team - Recruitment

What matters most is finding students with excitement for and consistent commitment to the team.

- Interest Meeting to Highlight Events, Set Expectations
- Advertise a Meeting Schedule and Stick to It
 - Pick a Practice Day. Time and Location
 - Make sure it follows your school's expectations for after-school activities
- Advertise the Regional Tournament Commitment Up Front



Starting a Team - Recruitment

Talking Points:

- Events cover a wide range of science topics, so students often have expert topic areas
- Students compete in all events with a partner or two
- Students receive medals by event
- Team scores determined by student scores in individual events
- Top teams progress to the next level of competition



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Starting a Team - Registration

Registration Opens Tuesday, September 26

- All you have to know to register is how many teams you're fielding
- All you have to submit is <u>two forms</u> with principal signatures and payment for your team(s)

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VASO Outreach Initiative

To be eligible for the grant, schools must:

- Be a middle or high school
- Be in their first or second year of participation in Science Olympiad
- Not be located in Alexandria City, Arlington County, Falls Church City, Fairfax City, Fairfax County, or Loudoun County

Available for the first team fielded by the school. The school may select to field additional teams, but those teams are not covered by the grant.

For the first year, the entire registration cost for one team will be covered.

For the second year, half of the registration cost for one team will be covered.

For Division C: Student Leadership

- VASO allows high school club officers to access registration/signup tools
- We ask that your team create a generic officer's email (like bluevalleywestscioly@gmail.com) and not use personal student email addresses
 - Student leaders can all check the account or have it forward to them
 - This email can be passed on to officer groups from year to year
- This email can be used in the VASO Portal, with a name indicating it is a student leadership account



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Organizing a Team - Event Assignments

Our Coach's Clinic (October 14) will go over this thoroughly.

- Download rule books from the link to Nationals on <u>our</u> website.
- Students and families can download them, too!
- Your team doesn't have to do every event. You decide.
- To cover all regionals events with 15 team members, each student does on average 3 events.



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Organizing a Team - Event Assignments

Some events require building a device to bring and test.

- These are often events that rookie teams consider skipping because of the materials and upfront prep for students.
- If you have students interested in building, go for it! We suggest not giving a student more than one build starting out.
- "Hints and Hacks" Series in November will be a resource for builders, so it is helpful to have event assignments scheduled by early Nov.

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Organizing a Team - Practices

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Pick a Practice Day, Time and Location

- Make sure it follows your school's expectations for after-school activities
- Once a week after school is a good starting point

What can practices look like?

- In early practices, getting to know each other!
- Having students explore events and giving input on what they want to do
- After event assignments, students should work with their partners to thoroughly read the rules. May need adult support in this for younger B students.



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Organizing a Team - Practices

Event Rules Guide the Rest - What are they being asked to do?

- What information do they have to learn?
- What device do they have to build?
- What task do they have to practice?

Some teams use parent/adult mentors to support smaller event groups.

Other teams make a schedule of what events have guided sessions on a certain day and others are in independent practice/research.

High school tends to be more student-driven rather than coach- or parent-driven.



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Supporting a Team - Resources

- The Nationals Rule Book is the #1 place to go for information on an event.
 - VASO will also post event information and any important changes, called "clarifications," on our website.
- Wide variety of online resources and communities, including official resources from Nationals (all optional)
- Specific supplies needed for events are in the rule book
 - Calculators
 - Goggles
 - Chemistry Event Supplies
- Other Building Events give parameters on what can/cannot be built, but material and design decisions are up to the students.

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Supporting a Team - Competition

The only competition you are committing to is Regionals.

Everything else is extra and up to you.

Regional Tournament - February 3, 17 or 24

- At Designated Location
- It's a full-day competition with all regional events
- Coaches and competitors plan for all-day commitment
- Teams provide volunteers to run and assist in events
- Awards Ceremony at the end



Supporting a Team - Community Engagement

You can't do it all on tournament day. (Believe me. I've tried.)

- Teams are responsible for covering volunteer shifts on tournament days. Set this expectation early for your team families.
 - Last year we asked for **three** volunteer shifts **per team** for the State tournament. Shifts were approximately 2.5 hours in length.
 - Duties included helping to time or measure devices in build events, assist in proctoring written events, helping grade or math check in the score room, etc.
 - Family members cannot volunteer for an event that their student competes in.
 - High school students can volunteer for service hours, but they can only volunteer in select Division B events or in a few other general capacities.



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Supporting a Team - Community Engagement

You can't do it all on tournament day.

(Believe me, I've tried.)

- Teams will also be asked to provide **event supervisors**.
 - This is a full-day tournament commitment where they are running and grading an event.
 - More guidance on this later, but just know this expectation for your team to relay to families or to recruit other faculty support.





Our tournaments at VT and Charlottesville in the past have had less of an ask science Olympiad for teams in terms of volunteers and event supervisors because we get college students/SO alums to run things. Something to think about...

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Supporting a Team - Competition

<u>Invitationals</u> are a great way to get students practice before the Regional tournament, *if you're up for it*.

- In Virginia, there will be a few invitational opportunities:
 - o Lake Braddock (Div B) Dec 9
 - o Fairfax (Div C) Jan 6
 - Virginia Tech (Div C) Jan 27
- Some other invitationals are now virtual across the country, so it's an easy way to get written test questions for practice without having to travel.



Supporting a Team - Competition

- Schools qualify for the State tournament based on their regional performance against only the other schools at their regional.
- The number of schools that qualify from each regional depends on how large the regional is and how many schools (not teams) compete.
- In the past years, we have invited 24 schools per division to State.
- Don't put pressure on yourself or your team to qualify for State in your first year.

New! Gold Bids to State

Our new Gold Bids can instead be a great motivator, especially for smaller teams or new teams with a few highly invested participants.

If a school does not qualify for the State tournament but does have an event team that takes gold (first place) in a regional event, the specific students of that event team are invited to the State tournament to compete in that specific event.

Example from the 2023 Michigan season:

- Haslett HS did not qualify for the State tournament, but they took first place in Experimental Design at their regional.
- The three students who earned that regional gold (no subs!) were invited to State to compete in Experimental Design.
- They earned second place at State in that event as an exhibition team:

1st - Athens HS

2nd - Haslett HS (Gold Bid)

2nd - East Lansing HS

3rd - Eisenhower HS
